

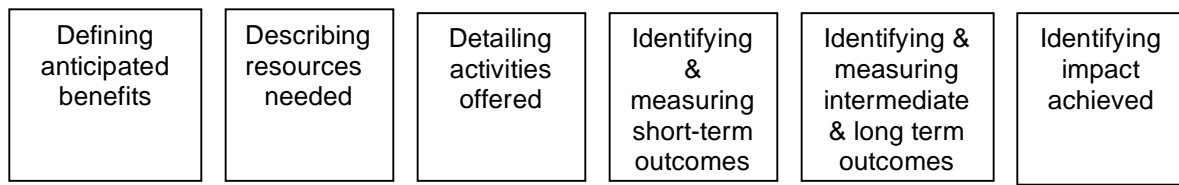
Logic Model

The Jewish Fund would like each potential grantee to provide an explicit overview of how it will evaluate the effectiveness of the grant received. We are suggesting that grantees utilize the Logic Model to accomplish this. We suggest the Logic Model as it is a visual method of clearly presenting the steps needed to accomplish the program and a clear roadmap for achieving the end result.

The Logic Model begins by defining the outcome and anticipated impact of the program or service. It then details the steps required to achieve this result. By utilizing the Logic Model, planners begin with considering the intended outcomes, and *think backwards* to identify how best to achieve the desired results.

The Logic Model is often used by non-profit organizations because the goal is to measure outcomes beyond financial impacts.

The model can have a total of up to six phases including:
